Discovery in the Streams: The Solstice Creekmussel Emerges as a Completely New Species

Tiny mussel, big conservation story - new species found only in NC streams

Biologists with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission (NCWRC) have uncovered a remarkable find—a completely new genus and species of freshwater mussel found only in a few short miles of central North Carolina streams. Named Ligodonta obscura, or the solstice creekmussel, the tiny mussel's discovery represents both a scientific breakthrough and a call to conservation action.

The story began in 2016 during a routine mussel survey on the Little River, when researchers noticed one specimen that didn't quite match the traits of the familiar green floater. Further genetic testing confirmed what no one expected: the mussel was not only a new species but unique enough to warrant its own genus. "We noticed that some of the shell characteristics, particularly the internal teeth, did not align with those of the green floater," explained Landscape Conservation Coordinator Brena Jones. "We were able to use genetic analysis to confirm that [this mussel] was indeed a unique species in its own taxonomic group.

The mussel, nicknamed the solstice creekmussel for its winter spawning season, is currently found only within about eight miles of two small watersheds in the Yadkin-Pee Dee River system. Today, its known population is confined to just a four-mile stretch of one stream—making L. obscura "microendemic," meaning it exists nowhere else on Earth. "This species was likely always relatively rare, but now we can only find it in one section of one stream on the entire planet!" said Aquatic Wildlife Diversity Coordinator Michael Perkins. "It's special and unique to only here, and the value of that is difficult to overstate.

Freshwater mussels like L. obscura play an essential role in maintaining clean waterways by filtering water, cycling nutrients, and supporting river ecosystems. "Mussels are like canaries in a coal mine," said Inland Fisheries Assistant Chief Rachael Hoch. "They thrive in clean water, so their health tells us a lot about the health of our rivers." Because the solstice creekmussel is so rare and confined to such a small area,

protecting its habitat has become an urgent priority for NCWRC. Jones added, "If our populations of native aquatic species are declining or lost, it means our water supply is also degraded—and we need to take action to protect and restore both for the future of human and wildlife communities.

Residents can help by avoiding moving aquatic species between waterways, maintaining streamside vegetation, and supporting conservation funding and cleanup efforts through organizations like River Keeper and Wildlife Diversity.

Biologists Brena Jones, Heather Evans, Sierra Benfield, and Michael Perkins led the discovery effort, confirming that even well-studied regions still hold hidden wonders. "Every animal, no matter how big or small, how common or rare, has its place in the

world," said Perkins. "It's amazing to still discover species in a place that's been inhabited for so long.
