Free Energy Audits for Homeowners

Homeowners in a 14-county area of North and South Carolina have until December 31 to apply for free energy audits. The audits will identify home improvement options that can save energy and money, while also increasing comfort and improving indoor air quality. An initiative of Connect Our Future and funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), the Neighborhood Energy Profile Database and Energy Efficiency Recommendations (NEPDEER) program will select 30 homes to receive two free seasonal audits, one in the winter of 2014 and one in the summer of 2014. NEPDEER also will choose 12 homes from this group to receive in-home energy monitoring services.

An energy audit is a combination of tests and inspections performed by a trained professional in order to assess the energy efficiency of a home. An energy auditor will typically test for air leakage and infiltration in the building's structure and in the ductwork of the heating and air conditioning system. The auditor also will do a thorough walk-through inspection of every room of the house including the crawl space and attic. Homeowners must be present during the energy audits. In-home energy monitoring consists of collecting data over a six-month period about how the 12 selected homes use energy.

Participants in the program will learn how to make their homes more energy efficient through corrective home improvement measures and modifications to their own energy consumption. Their participation also will contribute to the development of a much-needed database about residential energy use in the region.

To qualify, applicants must meet three basic requirements. First, they must be homeowners who have lived in their homes at least one year. Second, only single-family detached homes are eligible for the program. Third, homeowners must live in one of the following counties: Anson, Cabarrus, Cleveland, Gaston, Iredell, Lincoln, Mecklenburg, Rowan, Stanly and Union in North Carolina or Chester, Lancaster, Union and York in South Carolina.
