Special December topics include Dementia Conversations: Driving, Doctor Visits, Legal & Financial Planning

While the on-going coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic still threatens the health of millions in this country and around the world, it continues to create additional challenges for people living with Alzheimer's and all dementia, their families and caregivers, including 180,000 in North Carolina and their estimated 479,000 caregivers.

The Alzheimer's Association, Western Carolina Chapter and the Alzheimer's Association, Eastern North Carolina Chapter are continuing to offer free virtual education programs and online support groups to help all North Carolina caregivers and their families. Launched in May in response to the impact COVID-19 was having on those affected by dementia, the Alzheimer's Association now offers a number of education programs that can help those living with Alzheimer's and their families understand what to expect so they can be prepared to meet the changes ahead.

"From the health risks of COVID-19 to the social isolation caused by the pandemic, we serve a vulnerable population. We see it as our duty to ensure that all North Carolina caregivers have access to Alzheimer's Association resources," said Katherine L. Lambert, CEO of the Western Carolina Chapter. "The COVID-19 crisis continues to alter daily lives, but the needs of Alzheimer's caregivers persist. These online programs allow us to connect with caregivers and provide necessary information especially amid the on-going crisis.

Featured topics for December center around the difficult but important conversations that need to occur when someone starts to exhibit signs of dementia:

• Dementia Conversations: Driving, Doctor Visits, Legal & Financial Planning Often, conversations with family about changing behaviors can be challenging and uncomfortable. This program provides tips for breaking the ice with your family so you can address some of the most common issues that are difficult to discuss: going to the doctor for a diagnosis or medical treatment, deciding when to stop driving, and making legal and financial plans for future care. This program will be held on December 3 and December 15.

• Legal and Financial Issues The diagnosis of Alzheimer's disease makes planning for the future more important than ever. Concerns about care provision and programs that can help offset costs mean that families need accurate information about legal and financial planning specific to the disease. This is an interactive program where you will have a chance to learn about important legal and financial issues to consider, how to put plans in place, and how to access legal and financial resources near you. This program will be held on December 9. Other programs in December include:

- Caregiving for the Holidays 10 Warning Signs of Alzheimer's Understanding Alzheimer's and Dementia
- Healthy Living for your Brain and Body Understanding and Responding to Dementia- Related Behavior

Effective Communication Strategies

Each virtual education program is approximately one hour and allows the audience to ask questions and engage with others going through the journey.

State of NC Annual Student Internship Program

The State of North Carolina Internship Program is now accepting applications for summer 2021. College students interested in careers in state government can apply to participate in the summer enrichment program beginning November 2, 2020 through January 4, 2021.

Students can choose from a list of internship opportunities using an online portal located on the NC Department of Administration's Council for Women and Youth Involvement website, which includes an interactive map for students to easily apply for state government internship opportunities across the state.

The State of North Carolina Internship Program is a great opportunity for students to not only receive college credits and professional development experience, but also to serve as public servants for our state," said NC Department of Administration Secretary Machelle Sanders. "Each year we look forward to working with students from across the state, preparing them for the jobs of today and tomorrow."

Since its establishment in 1969, more than 4,300 internship opportunities have been awarded to North Carolina college students. The internship program is open to all North Carolina residents attending a college, university, technical institute, or community college. This year's pool of internship projects may be remote, in-person or a hybrid depending on recommendations outlined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the NC Department of Health and Human Services and the Office of the Governor.

Student interns will earn a stipend of \$8.25 per hour and work 40-hours per week for 10-weeks during the summer, which runs May 24 - July 30, 2021. The State of North Carolina Internship Program offers students real-world experience in a wide range of state government workplaces. Internships provide opportunities for students to work in their chosen field and to consider careers in public service. The internships integrate education, career development and public service. Opportunities exist in numerous recognized fields of study, from marketing to policy and research. Interns also will participate in other activities that broaden their knowledge of public service and state government, such as virtual seminars and executive chat sessions with state government leaders for career development. Interns are selected through a competitive process overseen by the North Carolina Internship Council. Selection is based on a thorough review of applications, including academic records and interest in state government. Qualified candidates may be selected to interview with prospective supervisors, and matches are made.
