Warning! Net Wrap and Twine Causing Plastic Disease in Cattle

When cattle ingest things like nails, staples, wire or other pieces of metal, they can develop what is known as hardware disease. Whether they are eating in a hurry, taking too big of a bite, or just being curious, it can easily happen.

However, hardware disease is not the only disease they are vulnerable to from eating foreign material. Plastic disease has also been identified to cause problems. This happens when a cow ingests items like twine, net wrap or plastic garbage. When a cow is eating, rather than spitting it out, they usually keep chewing and swallow whatever was in that bite. Sometimes these materials cause just as much damage as hardware disease, including death.

Unlike hardware disease where a rumen magnet can be inserted to keep the metal material in the rumen, there is no way to keep plastic in place. The plastic then can become a problem in the digestive system.

Producers are learning the risks of leaving net wrap or twine on bales when leaving it on bales in a feeder, bale grazing, or using a bale processor to chop forage as it's being fed. In the stomach these plastics can get clumped into a hard mass, almost like a plastic stone. Sometimes the plastic never causes problems, but other times it can create blockages or partial blockages, causing bloat or impactions. It may take weeks or months for the plastic globs to form in the rumen, but there is no way for a cow to break the plastic down.

Many times, a cow can pass small masses. But always err on the side of caution by removing net wrap and twine before feeding, even if there has been moisture and the bale is frozen. If the wrap is frozen to the bale, the bale can be dropped from a tractor's loader to the ground to help break it loose before cutting the wrap off. If some frozen hay still remains stuck to part of the wrap, that piece should not be left in the field where cattle might eat it. Getting the wrap off the bale and out of the field can reduce other hazards such as entanglement. Consideration should be given to hay baled along the road. Plastic bags and other garbage can get baled. A

pasture or pen next to a road may have litter from passing cars or a nearby dumpster, construction sites, balloons, or a neighbor's garbage. There is no treatment for plastic disease. Therefore, the extra time it takes to cut the twine or net wrap off a bale and keeping hay fields and pastures free from plastic is worth preventing possible By Kinsey Everhart, Extension Agent, Livestock and Row Crops, NC Cooperative Extension
