Burning Ban Lifted in Anson County

Commissioner Steve Troxler of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services issued a statement on Monday, December 5 lifting the burning ban that had been placed on Anson County. Several other counties were affected also.

The statement reads: Due to a recent precipitation and lower fire danger, I have removed the restriction on open burning for Anson, Caswell, Davidson, Davie, Forsyth, Guilford, Montgomery, Randolph, Richmond, Rockingham, Rowan, Stanly, Stokes, Surry and Yadkin counties effective Monday, December 5, 2016, at 5 p.m.

'Tis the Season for Toy Safety

The Anson County Health Department would like to remind parents that with so many new toys on the market, it's easy to forget toy safety in the rush to finish holiday shopping. The good news is that the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) and U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) have already prevented many unsafe toys from hitting shelves and toy recalls have dramatically declined overall. Unfortunately, many toys can still be dangerous when used improperly or by younger children.

A new report by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) found that an estimated 185,500 children under the age of 15 were treated in emergency departments for toy-related injuries in 2015. Tragically, 11 children died. Children under the age of five accounted for nearly half of these injuries. Cuts, scrapes, and bruises were the most common toy-related injuries, with most injuries affecting the head or face. Out of a total of 50 categories of toys, non-motorized scooters were involved in one out of everv four iniuries.

There are several things to keep in mind when shopping for toys for children:

Age-appropriateness Not all "safe" toys are safe for all children—what's safe for your oldest child may still pose a danger to your youngest. Always follow the age recommendations and read the warnings on toys to check for safety hazards. Teach your older children to keep their toys away from their younger siblings.

Safety Gear When buying bicycles, skateboards, scooters, skis/snowboards, and similar toys, buy the proper safety gear as well. Make sure helmets are fitted properly. Most helmets should be replaced at least every five to ten years and after an impact.

Button Batteries and Magnets The small, powerful magnets found in magnetic building sets and desk toys can be lethal when ingested. While some of these products have been recalled, similar items are still on the market.

Button batteries can cause internal chemical burns in less than two hours when ingested. These batteries can be found in some games, toys, musical cards, watches, and flashing shoes. Make sure to keep these away from young children.

Recalls You can also subscribe to the CPSC Product Recall list to keep track of toys hat have been pulled from the market because of safety issues.

The Health Department encourages all parents to visit the CPSC website, www.cpsc.gov, for a list of resources to guide them through safe gift buying for young children.

Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. is a 501c (3) charity located in East Taunton. MA whose mission is to provide bullet and stab protective vests and other assistance to dogs of law enforcement and related agencies throughout the United States. The non-profit was established in 2009 to assist law enforcement agencies with this potentially lifesaving body armor for their four-legged K9 officers.

Free Groceries Available to **Eligible Families**

Since its inception, Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. has provided over 2,100 protective vests in 50 states through private and corporate donations at a cost of over 1.9 million dollars. All vests are custom made in the USA by Armor Express in Central Lake, MI.

The program is open to dogs actively employed in the US with law enforcement or related agencies who are certified and at least 20 months of age. New K9 graduates, as well as K9s with expired vests, are eligible to participate.

The donation to provide one protective vest for a law enforcement K9 is \$1,050. Each vest has a value between \$1,795 to \$2,234 with a five year warranty and an average weight of 4 to 5 pounds. There are an estimated 30,000 law enforcement K9s throughout the United States.

Free food products every Wednesday at 9 a.m.

The Burnsville Recreation & Learning Center (BRLC) Emergency Food Pantry will distribute free food products on Saturday, December 17 at 9 a.m. These foods are provided by the US Department of Agriculture.

The U.S. federal income guidelines will be a determining factor for each individual's eligibility and food items will only be available to Ansonians who qualify. Individuals who have not registered before nor received food from the BRLC Emergency Food Pantry must have financial documentation as proof of income to be served. A neighbor who does not have the necessary documentations will not be served. Families that receive food stamp assistance automatically qualify. Each family will only be provided these commodities this month. Parents are asked not to bring small children. Neighbors, please park in parking lot behind center.

BRLC distributes free groceries to eligible families on Wednesdays at 9 a.m. and at other times. You can contact them at 704-826-8182 for information. BRLC is located at 13349 Highway 742 North in Burnsville, across from the Fire Department.
