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1,176 Reported Cases of **COVID-19 in Anson County**

As of Monday, December 14 the Anson County Health Department posted that Anson County had 1,176 reported cases of COVID-19. 204 of those cases were active. At that point they had discharged 972 cases, 953 to baseline health and nineteen deaths.

The NC Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS) reported statewide as of Monday, Dec. 14 there were 441,365 total cases of COVID-19, with 5,855

deaths, 6,016,031 completed tests and 2,553 hospitalized. As of Monday, December 7 there were 404,032 total cases of COVID-19, with 5,605 deaths, 5,678,794 completed tests and 2,373 hospitalized. On November 2 there were 278.028 total cases of COVID-19, with 4.390 deaths, 4,116,019 completed tests and 1,146 hospitalized. On October 5 there were 219,754 total cases of COVID-19, with 3,637 deaths, 3,188,371 completed tests and 971 hospitalized.

Recent history in Anson County: March 31 - 1 case; April 28 - 23 cases; May 26 - 62 cases; June 22 - 107 cases; July 27 - 285 cases; August 3 - 306 cases; August 26 - 408 cases; September 4 - 461 cases; September 28 - 605 cases: October 5 - 649 cases: October 26 - 720 cases; November 2 - 738 cases; November 30 - 937 cases; December 7 - 1,029 cases.

Schools Return to All Remote Classes

Beginning on Monday, December 14 all schools in Anson County have transitioned back to remote learning only. Here is the release from the school system:

In consultation with the Anson County Health Department, Anson County Schools has made the decision to temporarily go 100 percent remote for all Anson County Schools' students beginning Monday, December 14 to Thursday, December 17 (Friday, December 18 is already a scheduled remote learning day).

This decision was made due to the increase of community transmissions of COVID-19 and to keep our school family safe.

All learning will continue remotely. Our students will observe Christmas and New Year's holidays December 21 - January 1. If there are any further changes, we will notify all students, parents and staff as soon as possible. As always, our priority will be the safety and well-being of our students and staff.

All high school EOC in-person testing for Biology, Math 1, Math 3 and English II as mandated by the NC Department of Instruction will be postponed until second semester. All CTE state assessments that require in-person administration will also be postponed until second semester.

Order requires people to stay at home 10 p.m. to 5 a.m. Certain businesses required to be closed during those hours;

On Tuesday, December 8 Governor Roy Cooper and North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Dr. Mandy Cohen announced that North Carolina will begin a Modified Stay at Home Order after a rapid increase in North Carolina's key COVID-19 trends. The Order requires people to stay at home between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. It took effect Friday, December 11

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and will be in place until at least January 8, 2021.

"We already have strong safety protocols and capacity limitations in place – including a statewide mask requirement. With this additional action beginning Friday, we hope to get these numbers down," Governor Cooper said. "Our new modified Stay At Home order aims to limit gatherings and get people home where they are safer, especially during the holidays. It's also a reminder that we must be vigilant the rest of the day – wearing a face mask when we are with people we don't live with, keeping a safe distance from others and washing our hands a lot.

The Order requires restaurants, bars, entertainment venues, personal care businesses and more to close at 10 pm. Travel to and from work; to obtain food, medical care, fuel or social services; or to take care of a family member is exempted. Read more in the Frequently Asked Questions document.

In the past week, North Carolina's case count has broken single-day records on three separate days, including crossing more than 6,000 cases per day on two of those days. Just a month ago, cases were under 3,000 per day. In recent days, the percent of tests returning positive has increased to more than 10%.

Governor Cooper was clear that further action would be taken to slow the spread of the virus if trends do not improve. This could require further limiting of restaurant dining, indoor entertainment or shopping and retail capacity restrictions, among other safety protocols.

Dr. Cohen also provided an update on North Carolina's COVID-19 County Alert System map. The number of red counties (critical community spread) has more than doubled since November 23, up to 48 red counties from 20 red counties. There are now 34 orange counties (substantial community spread), as compared to 42 orange counties from the previous report. With today's report, more than 80% of the state's counties fall into the red or orange tier. Read the update to see where each county stands and how the system was designed.

"Your actions can keep people from getting sick, save lives, and make sure our hospitals can care for people whether it's for a heart attack or a car accident or COVID-19. Protect yourself, your loved ones, and your community now," said NCDHHS Secretary Mandy K. Cohen, M.D.
