## **Christmas Miracle Meal 2018 for Families in Need**

### A \$40 donation can provide a family of five a Christmas dinner plus leftovers

The Anson Crisis Ministry, working with Wadesboro IGA and First Baptist Church, is preparing for this year's Christmas Miracle Meal project. Other churches and individuals in the county are invited to participate.

A Christmas Miracle Meal is a box of food that will feed a family of five a Christmas dinner, plus enough for leftovers. These boxed meals will be handed out to 100 needy families in the county.

For a \$40 donation, you can supply a box that includes a 12-14 pound turkey, dressing, potatoes, yams, cranberry sauce, green beans, rolls, sugar, brown sugar, butter, eggs, cornbread, gravy, onions, bread and more.

Families receiving food have been identified through the Anson Crisis Ministry. However, any church in the area can also refer families to be added to this list. Please contact Margot Barnes at the Anson Crisis Ministry at 704-694-2445 to refer families.

Churches are encouraged to partner in this project by referring families, donating funds, and even helping with the packing and distribution. Boxes will be packed with non-perishable food items on Thursday, December 20 and again on Saturday, December 22 with perishable items.

Boxes will then be available for pick-up by identified families at First Baptist Church on Lee Avenue, from 8:30 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. that Saturday. Volunteers are needed for both packing days and distribution.

If you would like to help feed a Christmas meal to a needy family, checks can be made payable to First Baptist Church and delivered to the church office at P.O. Box 423 or 309 Lee Avenue in Wadesboro.

The 2018 goal is \$4,000. If more funds are received, more meals can be purchased for more families. Christmas is coming. Consider sharing blessings with an Anson County family in need this year.

# The Ryan White Program at the Anson County Health Department

Throughout the cold winter month of December, the Anson County Health Department is participating in World AIDS Day. World AIDS Day is used to raise awareness about HIV/AIDS, encourage people to get tested, and take action to support people living with HIV.

World AIDS Day is a worldwide benefit to raise awareness, fight prejudgment, and improve education about HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. World AIDS Day is each December 1.

Around the world, about 37 million people are living with HIV. In the United States, about 38,500 people get infected with HIV every year. The only way to know if you have HIV is to get tested. It's important that everyone ages 15 to 65 gets tested for HIV at least once. Some people may need to get tested more often. Some people living with HIV may have little to no ac cess to health care resources than others living with HIV. This may be due to:

# Martin Farms Named 2018 Outstanding Farm of the Year

The Anson County Cooperative Extension Agency has selected Martin Farms in Ansonville as the Outstanding Farm of the Year for 2018. Martin Farms is a multi-generational family farm managed by brothers Jimmy and Fincher Martin, along with Fincher's wife

Lynetta and two daughters Akela and Lynlee Martin. Jimmy and Fincher Martin have farmed for as early as they can remember. They started with chickens, eggs and cattle. Then, in the late 1960s and early 1970s they began working with their father J. E.



Martin and diversified with corn, soybeans, wheat and grain sorghum. In the late 1990s they added cotton. Today they still raise these row crops, plus beef cattle.

Fincher's wife Lynetta Martin is a teacher at Ansonville Elementary, but also helps in all aspects of the farm business: planning, purchasing, maintenance and repairs, planting, harvesting and selling crops. Their oldest daughter Akela is active in Anson High School's Future Farmers of America (FFA) organization as the 2018-19 Chapter President, having even established her own corn research plot this year, comparing fertilizer sources. Her younger sister Lynlee enjoys riding the combine and tractors during the harvest and shares her mother's passion for teaching.

The Martins feel it is important for youth and adults to have an understanding of how food and fiber is produced. Fincher Martin has shared his knowledge and experiences farming with third grade classes for many years, teaching them about cotton, and he currently serves on the FFA Alumni Advisory Committee. He has hosted farm visits with Leadership Anson groups to discuss agricultural issues, and is a current member of the Anson Cattlemen's Association.

Jimmy and Fincher have planted test plots for Anson Extension and NC State University, on and off, for more than 40 years. Just last month the two families hosted a NC Agromedicine Institute workshop on Grain Bin Safety/Grain Rescue for 25 first responders who had an opportunity to train with specialized equipment, and practice hands-on rescue scenarios. The Martins are also active members of Red Hill Baptist Church.

Thank you Martin Family for your community involvement, FFA participation, agronomic research, and willingness to share Martin Farms' story with younger generations and the non-farming community. It's a great way to honor Anson's agricultural heritage.

The Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program provides primary medical care and support services for people living with HIV who are uninsured or underinsured. The Program works with cities, states, and local community-based organizations to provide HIV care and treatment services to more than half a million people each year. The Program reaches approximately 52% of all people diagnosed with HIV in the United States. The Program serves as an important source of ongoing access to HIV medication that can enable people living with HIV to live close to normal lifespans.

The Ryan White program covers people affected by HIV in Anson, Cabarrus, Gaston, Mecklenburg, Union Counties, North Carolina; and York County, South Carolina. The program provides resources such as:

- No health insurance
- Medical, dental, and vision care
- Health insurance assistance
- Transportation
- Child care and family services
- Mental health and substance use
- Housing
- Food, clothing, and financial assistance

• Employment assistance

The Ryan White program is offered in Anson County. For more information about the program or assistance getting started, please call Dinikia Savage at 704-994-3342. The Anson County Health Department also offers free HIV and STD testing.

The Health Department's hours are Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The walk-in hours for the STD clinic are Monday through Thursday, 8:30 to 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 to 3:30 p.m. For more information on HIV and STDs, symptoms, or treatment contact STD nurse Lori Burr at 704-994-3340.
