Three Bungling Crooks Caught Red Handed After Burglary, Items Recovered

Anson County Sheriff's Deputies have charged three men with breaking and entering a home in the Lilesville area after the homeowner returned home and saw the suspects run from the house. The homeowner followed the suspects' vehicle,

direction of travel. The suspect vehicle turned and went toward Richmond County. We gave out a description to Richmond and shortly they spotted the car and stopped it," Sheriff Tommy Allen said.

Anson Deputies returned the suspects to Anson County. Deputies later returned to Richmond County and found items taken from the house that had been dumped in a wooded area prior to the suspects being stopped by Richmond Deputies. Items recovered included a 50 inch Flat Screen TV, an X-Box and iPod. All three men were charged with Breaking and Entering and Felony Larceny. There are identified as: Nelson Alexander Young, age 23, of Wadesboro; Devon Marques Clyburn, age 17 of Lilesville; and Marguel Jamar Bennett, age 23 of Wadesboro. Young and Clyburn were put in the Anson County Jail under a \$50,000 bond. Bennett's bond was set at \$5,000.

The Municipal Election will be held next Tuesday, November 8, 2011. The polls will be open for voting on Election Day from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

The deadline to register to vote on Election Day was October 14th. If you are already registered to vote in Anson County (and your name or address has not changed) vou did not need to register again to vote in this election.

The deadline to apply for an Absentee by Mail ballot was November 1st.

One-Stop Voting ends on Saturday, November 5th at 1 p.m. It takes place at the Board of Elections Office at 101 South Greene Street, Suite B-01 in uptown Wadesboro on the square. The hours of operation will be 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. On Saturday, November 5 the hours are 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Canvass Day will be held at 11 a.m. in the Board of Elections Office on Tuesday, November 15, 2011.

Any questions about registration, absentee ballots, location of voting places, and other election matters may be answered by calling the Board of Elections office at 704-994-3223 between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Election Day Polling places: For the Polling places listed below, a Buffer Zone will be marked by signs placed 50 feet from the entrance to each polling place. No campaigning or electionrelated activity is allowed inside the 50 foot Buffer Zone or inside the polling place. Campaign signs must be placed outside the Buffer Zone and behind any public street right-of- way.

The program, with assistance from South Piedmont Community College and Hornwood, is designed to develop a commitment to community through leadership.

Anyone who is an Anson County resident or who works in Anson County is eligible to participate. The selection of class participants is based upon the applicant's community interests and current involvement, leadership potential, past accomplishments and the willingness to assume expanded leadership responsibilities. Participation will be limited. The six-month, 11-session program will kick off with an overnight retreat at the Beth Haltiwanger Center in Montgomery County Jan. 13-14, 2012. Unemployment Rate 12.2% in September

Anson County had an unemployment percentage of 12.2% for the month of September, little changed from August's 12.5%. The whole state of North Carolina showed a similar small drop in unemployment in September, to 10% from August's 10.4%.

Anson's total labor force in September was 9,743. Of that number 8,551 were employed and 1,192 were unemployed. In August the total labor force was 9,701, with 8,485 employed and 1,216 unemployed.

Unemployment rates decreased in nearly all of North Carolina's 100 counties in September. Rates decreased in 92 counties, increased in four and remained the same in four.

The September data demonstrate a decrease in the unemployment rate for most of North Carolina's counties,' said ESC Chairman Lynn R. Holmes. "However, many counties still face high unemployment rates. This agency continues to focus on helping our customers find work and get the assistance they need."

North Carolina had 45 counties that were at or below the state's unadjusted unemployment rate of 10 percent. Rates decreased in all 14 of the state's Metropolitan Statistical Areas.

Statewide the number of workers employed (not-seasonally adjusted) increased in September by 22,710 to 4,061,954. The number of people unemployed decreased by 22,970. The number of unemployed people in September was 451,505 workers, compared with 474,475 in August.

In a release from Kim Wilson at the Anson County Partnership for Children: At Wadesboro's People Fest festival 120 families participated in surveys entitled "How Well Do You Know Your Children? and "How Well Do You Know Your Parents?" between parents/grandparents and youth. Participants were entered in a drawing to win a gift card valued at \$50, and the winners were Ms. Hattie Little and Ms. Georgia Medley.

The surveys were distributed by the Anson County Partnership for Children to celebrate October as "National Let's Talk Month" on Saturday, October 8th. In addition to the survey, parents/grandparents were given timely information about effective communication with their children/grandchildren. This information was disseminated through APPCNC (Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Campaign of North Carolina) and adapted with permission from the Family Health Council, Inc., Pittsburgh, PA: We know it's easy to say, "Kids are just different today!" However, parents still matter! Good

research tells us that parents still have the most important voice when it comes to young people's views about sex - more than friends or the media. Eight out of ten teens say it would be easier to avoid sex if they could have more open communications with their parents about sex.

Education and information help young people take personal responsibility for important life decisions - parent/child communications will always be one of the most important parts of helping young people become solid, healthy adults.

Drawing winners had the following comments about the experience: Ms. Medley said that she knew certain things about her grandson, but was surprised to find out that he liked the sport of boxing. She stated, "We have a good relationship." Ms. Little credited her faith for the relationship she has with her children and grandchildren. She commented, "I go to church and pray. God guides me to have that good relationship with my children and grandchildren."

The communication and conversations can be inter-generational. The trick is just to keep the lines of communication open.

To date the Partnership has collaborations with Anson County Schools to address House Bill 88 to enact the Healthy Youth Act in our schools, and with the local grassroots organization HOLLA! (Helping Our Loved Ones Learn and Achieve). Holla hosts the Teen Outreach Program (TOP) youth development sessions at the Mary E. Little Center in Morven. These organizations recognize that a child's parent is his/her first and most important teacher. Communicating with children daily is one of the many hats parents wear as they parent in today's world. Fortunately parents in Anson County are not alone in these communication efforts with young people. The Anson County Partnership for Children, Anson County Schools, Holla, churches and community organizations all offer support and resources to help parents be ready when his / her child says, "Let's talk."
